
Chapter business will begin at 7 pm at the Kennedy Library. Kirk's program will get underway at 7:15.

# **Crab Spider Ecology**

You may not have known it at the time, but that striking spider, sitting exposed on a flower head, may have been a crab spider. These small spiders are harmless to humans but adept at capturing insect prey larger than themselves – and all without a web! They are also one of the rare animals that change color to match their background.

On Wednesday, June 11, Dr. Gary Dodson will discuss these crab spider phenomena as well as their fascinating mating system. A professor of biology at Ball State Univer-

To get there on your own: From Muncie head north on Broadway and continue north on State Rd. 67. Follow 67 through Albany to Portland. In Portland, 67 takes a left. Continue on 67 into Bryant, where you should continue straight onto north 27 at the traffic light. (State Rd. 67 turns right at this point; don't turn there or you'll end up in Ohio!) Once in Geneva, turn right into the Visitor Center parking lot. The address is 200 E. 6th Street.

We'll meet at the Visitor Center at 9:30.

March 15: Prairie Creek Reservoir: Ten of us gathered at Prairie Creek. Fortunately enough, ice had melted to allow open water that enticed some migrating waterfowl. We saw wood ducks, ring-necked ducks, lesser scaups, one pintail duck, two ruddy ducks, common mergansers, and various songbirds. We also stopped by the eagle's nest for a view of the female bald eagle on the nest.

# Saying good-bye to the Bird of the Month

In October 1999, our chapter newsletter editor issued a eastern blue-call for someone to write a regular column about the "Bird of the Month." Helen Twibell, a long-time Audubon member and bird-lover, responded to that call and submitted her first article, on the indigo bunting. eastern bluebird, and she bird, and she box situated a box situated a few feet from

"Bird of the Month" quickly became one of the most popular features of our newsletter, which was a monthly publication at the time. In each installment, Helen shared her love of Indiana birds, both resident and migratory, working her way through backyard birds that Audubon readers might not have known much about or given a second thought to – until they read her column.

"When I ran out of songbirds, I started writing about water birds," Helen recalls of the 80 or so articles she has written.

In each column, Helen combined extensive research with a "human interest" approach, intertwining details of anatomy, plumage, breeding and nesting habits, and other distinguishing traits and behaviors with her own observations of the bird.

Now, at 86, Helen decided it's time to put down her pen and enjoy a second retirement. (Her first came after she retired from more than 30 years as a teacher in Blackford County, most of those years teaching fourth graders.)

This doesn't mean that Helen will spend any less time watching and enjoying birds. Her favorite bird is the

eastern bluebird, and she has a bluebird box situated a few feet from her home, ready to welcome tenants.

Helen's final article, on the snow goose, appeared in the Nov./Dec. 2013 issue, exactly 14 years after she happily took on the role of "Bird of the Month" columnist.



"I've loved doing it," she said, but probably not as much as we've all loved reading her column.

On behalf of RCAS members and friends – and all those birds – we offer a grateful thanks to Helen for her many years of dedicated service.

Wright Trail. In addition to the beautiful vistas along the Big Blue River, we saw many of our year-round resident songbirds and also "first of season" eastern towhee and eastern phoebes. We enjoyed watching nesting behaviors of white-breasted nuthatches and downy woodpeckers. We also got good looks at a pair of wood ducks and a brown creeper. The woods were lovely, but we were too early for wildflowers.
