Photos from Red-tail Land Conservancy's website, www.fortheland.org Join us on June 19 when Julie Borgmann, executive director of Red-tail Land Conservancy (RLC), will share information about Red-tail's recent land acquisitions, restoration projects, and outreach programs. Red-tail protects nearly 3,000

acres in east-central Indiana, including ten nature preserves that are open to the public. Join us to learn more about these important conservation areas and the work of your local land trust.

Julie Borgmann joined the staff of RLC in 2015 following a 25-year career as a pharmacist. Starting out as a volunteer, Borgmann served as the education and

outreach director and then as development director before becoming the executive director in 2018.

The program will start at 7 pm at the Ball State University Nature Lab at 2500 West University Avenue on the BSU Campus. Parking is available in front of the greenhouse and is free after 5 pm. The building is handicap accessible.

And while we are on the subject of Redtail Land Conservancy, here is a reminder that RCAS has agreed to be a steward at Dutro-Ernst Woods, a Red-tail nature preserve located in Muncie, on Kilgore Avenue. RCAS recently installed new bluebird houses on the preserve. Thanks to Jim Flowers for constructing them, and to Jim, Annette Rose and Jim and Rose Jeffery for the installation!

In addition to maintaining the bluebird houses, RCAS has promised to regularly walk the trails, pick up any accessible trash, and report any disturbances to Redtail staff. The preserve is small. The entire trail is just a little more than a mile long. Fortunately, there is usually very little litter. We pick up what we see from the trail and the parking lot.

On March 13, 2024, graduate student Abby Shaw from the Ball State University (BSU) Department of Landscape Architecture hosted a presentation on bird mortality from collisions with the



BSU Architecture Building. Ashley Fitch and Emily Peterson from the Department of Biology shared their research on campus bird window collisions, and John Just, an architectural manager from Walker Glass Company, discussed bird-friendly window glazing options. Twenty-five people were in attendance for the presentation. A competition for College of Architecture and Planning (CAP) students to redesign the south side of the Architecture Building ended on March 29. Four designs were submitted, and award winners were selected through a

judging panel and a CAP student survey. The next initiative is to get bird-friendly materials implemented in the upcoming Architecture Building renovation with design inspiration from the student competition submissions.



The competition was judged by a panel comprising

- Dr. Annette Rose, Associate Professor of Educational Studies at BSU and president of RCAS
- Dr. Kamal Islam, Professor of Biology at BSU and RCAS board member
- Andrea Swartz, Associate Dean of the College of Architecture and Planning and Professor of Architecture at BSU
- Timothy Gray, Professor of Architecture at BSU
- John Just, Architectural Manager of Walker Glass Company, and
- Abby Shaw, Master of Landscape Architecture student at BSU and education chair for RCAS.

Notes from the Field

Here are just a couple of the notable sightings that RCAS members photographed this past winter. Terri Gorney Lehman reported that on February 4 she and Randy Lehman saw four Brewer's Blackbirds at Limberlost Swamp Nature Preserve—their first ever wintertime sighting of the species at the preserve. According to Peterson's guide, Brewer's Blackbirds keep their plumage all year, whereas Rusty blackbirds change

plumage. Randy's photo does a great job of capturing the purple and green sheens that these birds exhibit when the lighting is just right. Randy and Terri had also recently enjoyed seeing Rough-legged Hawk, Snow Goose, four Northern Harriers, and Rusty Blackbirds at the preserve.

Then a month later, Kurt

Emmert photographed Short-eared Owls at the Academy of Model Aeronautics on the east side of Muncie. Lois and Erv Rockhill and I refound these birds a couple days later and were able to watch them hunting over one of the Academy's fields, along with a pair or Northern Harriers that entertained us with their interactive acrobatics.

Invasive Plant Removal at Mounds State Park

Not all RCAS field trips are birding trips. On March 23, eight RCAS members gathered at Mounds State Park to spend the morning removing invasive Burning Bush. In consultation with park staff we selected a sight on the trail that runs along the river, just below the hanging fen. It has been a good spot for bird sightings in the past. But the Burning Bush (Euonymus alatus) is threatening to take it over and choke out the mixed undergrowth that provides habitat that birds need. After a couple of hours of hard work we could see the difference. At that time of year few native plants have leafed

out. The light green haze on the right side of the photo below is yet-to-be-removed Burning Bush. On the left, the open woodland shows the results of our work.
